## CCCM

- In Tacloban, heads of schools have advised the CCCM team about the deadline of stay for camp residents temporarily residing in schools used as evacuation centres as classes will resume on the second week of January. IOM CCCM staff have identified the households in the “build zone” areas who are in need of shelter kits to facilitate their return to their houses.
- Following the joint assessment mission and meetings with authorities in Estancia regarding the evacuation centre, IOM has been requested by the Mayor of Estancia municipality to provide shelter assistance to the returnee families. IOM, in coordination with the Protection Cluster, is identifying the number of families requiring shelter assistance enabling them to return to their places of origin in Barangay Botongan.
- Following recent floods that have resulted in evacuations in some of the municipalities, an OCHA-led joint assessment mission (including CCCM) will be visiting Pontevedra municipality (Roxas) to assess the situation and related needs of the evacuee families.

## Shelter and NFIs

- IOM continues to distribute emergency shelter kits (ESKs) and non-food items (NFIs) in municipalities across Guiuan, Tacloban, Ormoc and Roxas. IOM has distributed emergency shelter kits to almost 59,000 households covering 84 per cent of the targeted 70,000 households. IOM has also distributed NFIs to 33,400 households covering 48 per cent of the targeted 70,000 households. Please find attached, a map illustrating IOM’s Shelter and NFI distribution in Guiuan, Tacloban, Ormoc and Roxas.

- In Guiuan, IOM works with the Philippine Coconut Authority and DSWD to provide useable lumber to facilitate the reconstruction of homes. The “Debris to Shelter” activity includes chainsaws and table saws, which are used for cutting coco lumber felled by the typhoon. Together with NFI distribution (corrugated iron roofing sheets, tool kits) and training on typhoon-resistant shelter construction techniques, the “Debris to Shelter” activity forms part of IOM’s recovery shelter programme, which aims to give beneficiaries the materials, tools and skills they need to advance self-recovery.



## Health

- IOM health programmes in Capiz have reached a total of 3,345 patients: 2,308 outpatient consultations; 545 immunizations; 345 maternal and child health consultations; 45 urgent referrals; and 102 diagnostic workup (e.g., laboratory tests, x-rays).
- IOM has delivered a 220kva generator to the Leyte Provincial Hospital to provide uninterrupted power supply for the running of operating theatres, emergency rooms and laboratories. The generator was donated by the Government of the United Kingdom.
- Health- and WASH-related needs were detected by CCCM team in Tacloban and have been reported to the relevant clusters for their actions:
  - Need for distribution of Aquatabs for safe drinking water in San Fernando, San Jose Health Center.
  - Need for provision of trash bags/bins for proper garbage disposal system at some camp sites.
- IOM has developed a paper to provide guidance on how health cluster partners and NGOs in the field could provide support to the Department of Health. The paper has been endorsed by the health cluster. It highlights potential issues in bunkhouses and offers strategies to address these.



## Protection

- Through coordination with the CCCM team, counter-trafficking Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials, which have been printed on t-shirts and banners, are being distributed to DSWD personnel and camp managers in Tacloban. The provision of IEC materials at Tacloban entry and exit points (seaports, airport and bus terminals) is also ongoing.
