Highlights

■ IOM launched USD 20 Million appeal for Hurricane Matthew response

3,900 households in the South, Grande Anse, Nippes and Ouest departments have received NFIs from the IOM-managed pipeline

Another 8,500 households are currently receiving NFIs in ongoing distributions that have been allocated to partners and to the Government

Situation Overview

On the morning of Tuesday 4 October, Hurricane Matthew, the first Category 4 to hit the country in the past 52 years with winds up to 150 mph (240 km/h) barreled into southern coastal towns including Jeremie, Les Cayes, Port Salut, Dame Marie and Jacmel, causing major damage to homes, schools and other public buildings.

- 1.4 million people in need of humanitarian assistance; 2.1 million individuals have been affected (UN-OCHA)
- Estimated casualties range from **300 deaths** according to the Directorate of Civil Protection (DPC) up to over **900 deaths** according to international media (The Telegraph)
- 80% of electricity network destroyed in the Southern peninsula and 90% of homes in the South and Grande Anse department have been damaged or destroyed by the Hurricane
- Land access to the most affected areas remains difficult and remote rural areas are slowly being assessed
- 192 temporary shelters are housing 61,537 displaced individuals according to the DPC
- 279 latrines destroyed or damaged in Camps in Port-au-Prince, increasing risks of cholera epidemic
- Important damages were reported to makeshifts tents housing returnees/deportees from the Dominican Republic in Anse-a-Pitres (Belle Anse)

IOM RESPONSE

Assessments

 34 multi-sectorial (CCCM/DRR/Protection) IOM emergency staff are carrying out rapid assessments of the situation in Grande Anse and South departments



NFI and Shelter

- At the request of the Ministry of Interior, IOM led a Shelter Working Group meeting at the National Emergency Center (COUN) to discuss the strategy for housing repair and reconstruction, including technical and financial support for self-construction.
- On 17 October, IOM facilitated the reception of 39 Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS) pallets and a cargo carrying 4750 pieces of plastic tarpaulins

Grande Anse:

 IOM led an NFI distribution targeting 200 of the worstaffected households in Jeremie on 16 October. These households received plastic tarpaulins and hygiene kits provided by USAID

- The distribution was coordinated with the World Food Program who provided essential foodstuff such as rice, oil and peas to the same households.
- IOM provided 5000 plastic tarpaulins to the Ministry of Interior on 16 October to assist affected families in Les Irois, Anse d'Haineault and Dame Marie.

South:

- A convoy of 8 trucks left Port au Prince on 15 October for Les Cayes. The trucks were carrying 3450 plastic tarpaulins, 1911 hygiene kits, 1 million aquatabs, 2000 jerrycans and 1200 blankets.
- International NGO Terre des Hommes received from IOM 1000 plastic tarpaulins, 1000 jerrycans, 1000 blankets and 1000 hygiene kits on 17 October for distribution in Les Cayes
- International NGO Catholic Relief Services (CRS) received 1500 plastic tarpaulins, 1000 jerry cans, 1500 hygiene kits and 875 blankets on 17 October for distribution in the areas of Camp Perin and Maniche
