OVERVIEW

Highlights


- ★ As of 7 October, a total of 721,772 migrants crossed Libya's borders.* This figure includes 311,770 TCNs, which represent 43% of total crossings. Movements still continue, with another 11,584 migrants (553 TCNs) crossing the borders to Tunisia, Egypt, Chad and Niger between 30 September and 6 October.
- IOM and its partners have assisted 210,739 migrants via a combination of charter flights, in-kind air assets, commercial flights, and land and sea vessels. The total caseload in need of evacuation at the Libyan borders is still estimated at 2,504 migrants.
- IOM has conducted two air evacuations since the beginning of October to transfer 119 TCNs from Misrata to Benghazi before they continue their journey onward to their country of origin. A third air evacuation is also underway. At the same time, evacuations by land from Benghazi to Salloum on the Egyptian boarder continue to assist 16,546 stranded migrants. Last operations took place on 3 and 5 October with the evacuation by bus of 181 migrants from seven different nationalities.

^{*}Cross-border movement statistics only refer to migrants leaving Libya.





LIBYA

Benghazi – IOM has conducted two air evacuations since the beginning of October to transfer 119 TCNs from Misrata to Benghazi before they continue their journey onward to their country of origin. A third air evacuation is underway.

At the same time, evacuations by land from Benghazi to Salloum on the Egyptian boarder continue to reach 16,546 stranded migrants who were assisted by land out of Libya. Last operation took place on 3 and 5 October with the evacuation by bus of 181 migrants from seven different nationalities

TUNISIA



9,287 migrants, out of which **335** were TCNs, crossed the border between 30 September and 6 October. This brings the cumulative total of arrivals to **313,414** migrants.

As of 6 October, direct transportation assistance from Tunisia was provided by IOM and its partners to **115,362** persons, including TCNs, by boat, as well as charters and commercial flights since the

beginning of the crisis. Between 30 September and 6 October, IOM assisted the repatriation of 31 TCNs.

EGYPT



Between 30 September and 6 October, **2,253** migrants, out of which **210** were TCNs, crossed the Egyptian border. This brings the cumulative total of arrivals to **229,514** migrants.

Since 26 February, IOM has evacuated **38,223** persons stranded in Egypt. Between 30 September and 6 October, IOM assisted the repatriation of 136 TCNs.

IOM's medical unit is continuing its efforts to combat the scabies epidemic on the Egyptian borders with Libya. After distributing new blankets and mattress, the community outreach are educating stranded migrants on prevention methods to avoid a second outbreak of the skin illness. Two new rub halls are being purchased to address a need for shelter on sight as many migrants remain housed in primitive makeshift tents in the open.

CHAD

Cholera Campaign and Public Information

A "Guide de Prevention Contre Le Cholera" brochure is being distributed to all migrants IOM receive and assist with transportation. Furthermore, IOM staff gives briefings and provides bars of hand soaps for each migrant. Large signs have been dispatched to all locations around Chad and are being installed near transit centers and way-stations to clearly communicate services provided to returnees by IOM and partners.

Protection

IOM continues to identify and address specific protection cases of returnees in need of assistance. IOM is helping minor returnees through family reunification in collaboration with the ICRC, and reintegration assistance. When IOM registers TCNs, UNHCR is informed to provide appropriate response. IOM also assists in providing stranded migrants with travel documents to depart from Chad by commercial flights back to their countries of origin.

IOM's operations have been largely supported by in-kind donations and financial contributions from

Australia, Austria, Bangladesh, Canada, Chad, Chile, Czech Republic, Finland, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Korea, the Netherlands, Norway, Switzerland, UK, US, as well as from ECHO, CERF, Vox relief Group, Bait El Zakat and the Al Maktoum Charity. This appreciated support has enabled IOM to alleviate the lives of thousands of persons in need.
