Recruiting is a Business

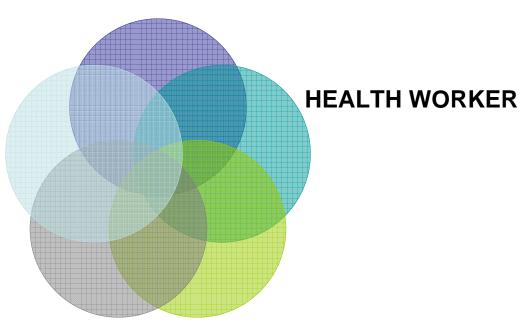
- Recruiters provide valuable services to employers and migrating workers alike.

Unique Role = Unique Insights

- Receiving Country Issues
 - Current and anticipated needs
 - Immigration Policy & Legislation
 - Professional Regulatory Requirements
 - Workplace integration challenges.



Unique Role = Unique Insights

- Sending Country Issues
 - Educational and professional appropriateness
 - Sustainability of recruitment efforts
 - Ethical considerations
 - Legacy Opportunities
 - Health workers return to sending country
 - Receiving country makes strategic investments in the sending country.



Recruitment Firms & Ethics

- Recruiters are able to educate employers.
- Recruiters should be paid by employers not the health worker.
- Recruiters advocate for the health worker.
- Recruiters negotiate terms that are equally fair to the employer and the health worker.



Strengthening Health Systems The Role of Business

- Business will identify opportunities for strategic investments, i.e.
 - Private business in receiving country invests in public university in sending country.
 - Private business and non-profit employers from receiving country establish/support health facilities in sending countries.

Strengthening Health Systems The Role of Government

- Ensure sustainability of public policies, i.e.
 - Enabling MDs to be licensed as nurses so they can more easily emigrate. (Philippines)
 - Restrictive immigration policies. (u.s.)
- Support public, private and non-profit involvement.
- Promote appropriate regulation of professions and credentials recognition.



The Road Ahead

 Receiving countries must understand and respect the needs of sending countries.

 Sending countries must ensure an environment that supports internal and external capital investments.
