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# IOM's 2012 Theme: **Managing Migration in Crisis Situations**



**A step-by-step process based on wide and continuing consultation**



**A positive step forward in:**

- IOM's ability to help people affected by a crisis
- IOM support to States to better respond to migration crises



**3 main messages for the Operational Framework:**

- A people-centric approach
- Based on strong partnerships
- An evolving process – premised on consultation and dialogue



# 2010-2011: Calling Attention to the “human mobility” aspects of crises

## Origins of the Operational Framework’s Development

I. Early Member States requests

II. Starting in 2010, in major humanitarian crises – such as Haiti, Pakistan, and Libya – IOM observed:

- more complex picture of vulnerability
- wide ranging challenges to migration management systems during crises
- long-standing consequences to individuals, societies, and their governments as a result of crisis-induced migration patterns

III. Increased IOM involvement at the policy level, such as the Transformative Agenda, on contemporary challenges to crisis response

*The Operational Framework is **IOM’s way** to better respond to the migration aspects of crises.*



# Identifying Gaps and Improving Responses

Identification of *operational* “gaps” or “challenges” to the provision of adequate assistance and protection to all those affected by a crisis.

6 key gaps:

Crises with complex patterns of **internal mobility** with long-term consequences on recovery, peace, security, and development

**International migrants caught in crisis** situations in a country of destination or transit

Crises that lead to the **cross-border movement** of persons that are not de jure or de facto covered under international protection

Crises **placing stress on migration management systems** (need for humanitarian border management; emergency consular assistance; robust referral mechanisms; or proactive protection measures against trafficking in persons)

Crisis situations that leave **countries of origin confronted with mass returns** and its long-term consequences

Other gaps within the system-wide approaches to crises, include **lack of inclusion of migration dynamics into broader preparedness efforts** and **lack of a sector for emergency transport** as a life saving measure



# Operational Framework: Based on the “migration crisis” concept

Based on the  
concept of a  
“Migration Crisis”

Complex and often large-scale **migration flows and mobility patterns** caused by a crisis, which typically:

- involve significant **vulnerabilities** for individuals and affected communities,
- and generate acute and longer-term **migration management challenges**.

A migration crisis:

- may be sudden or slow in onset,
- can have natural or man-made causes,
- and can take place internally or across borders.

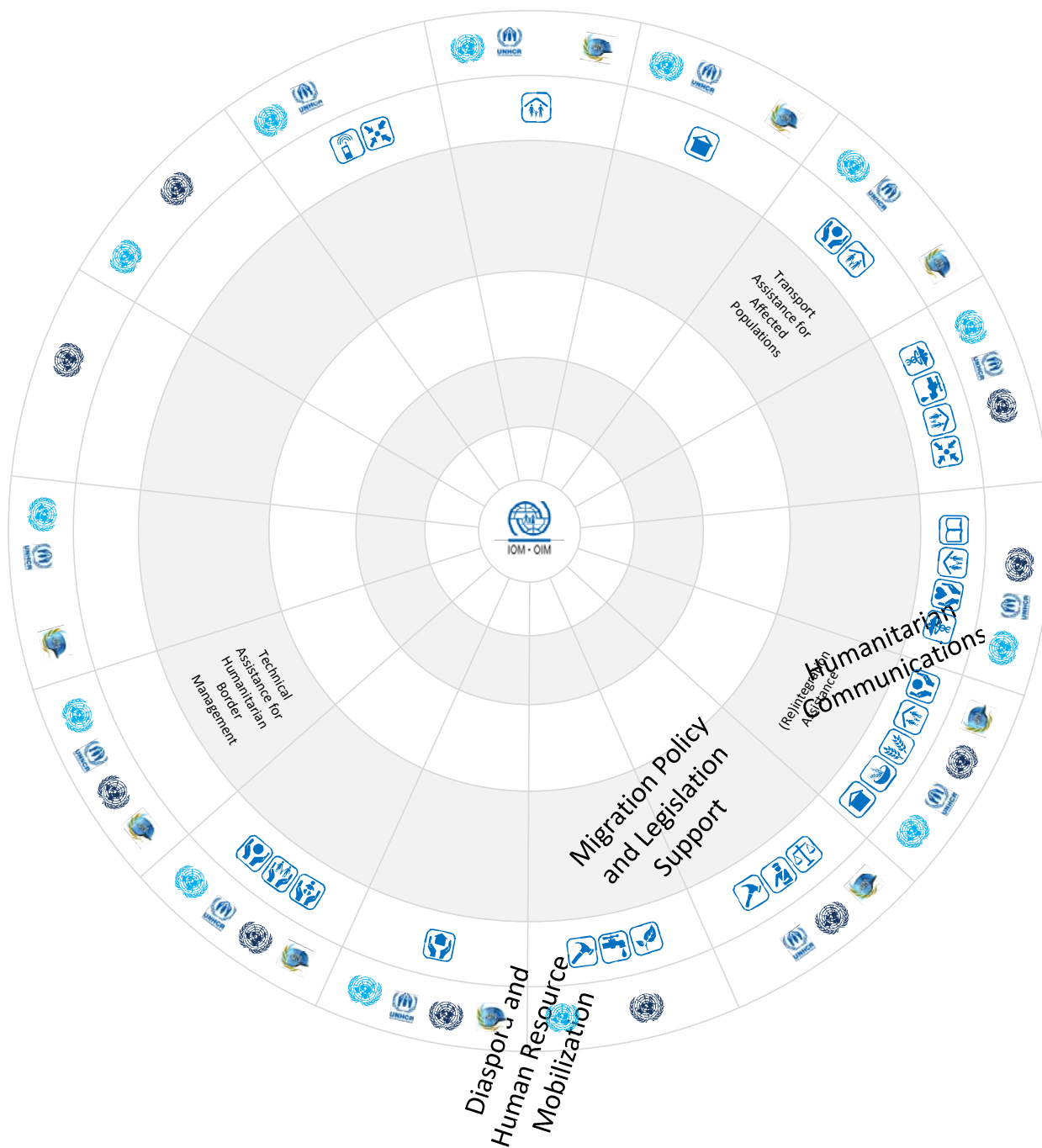

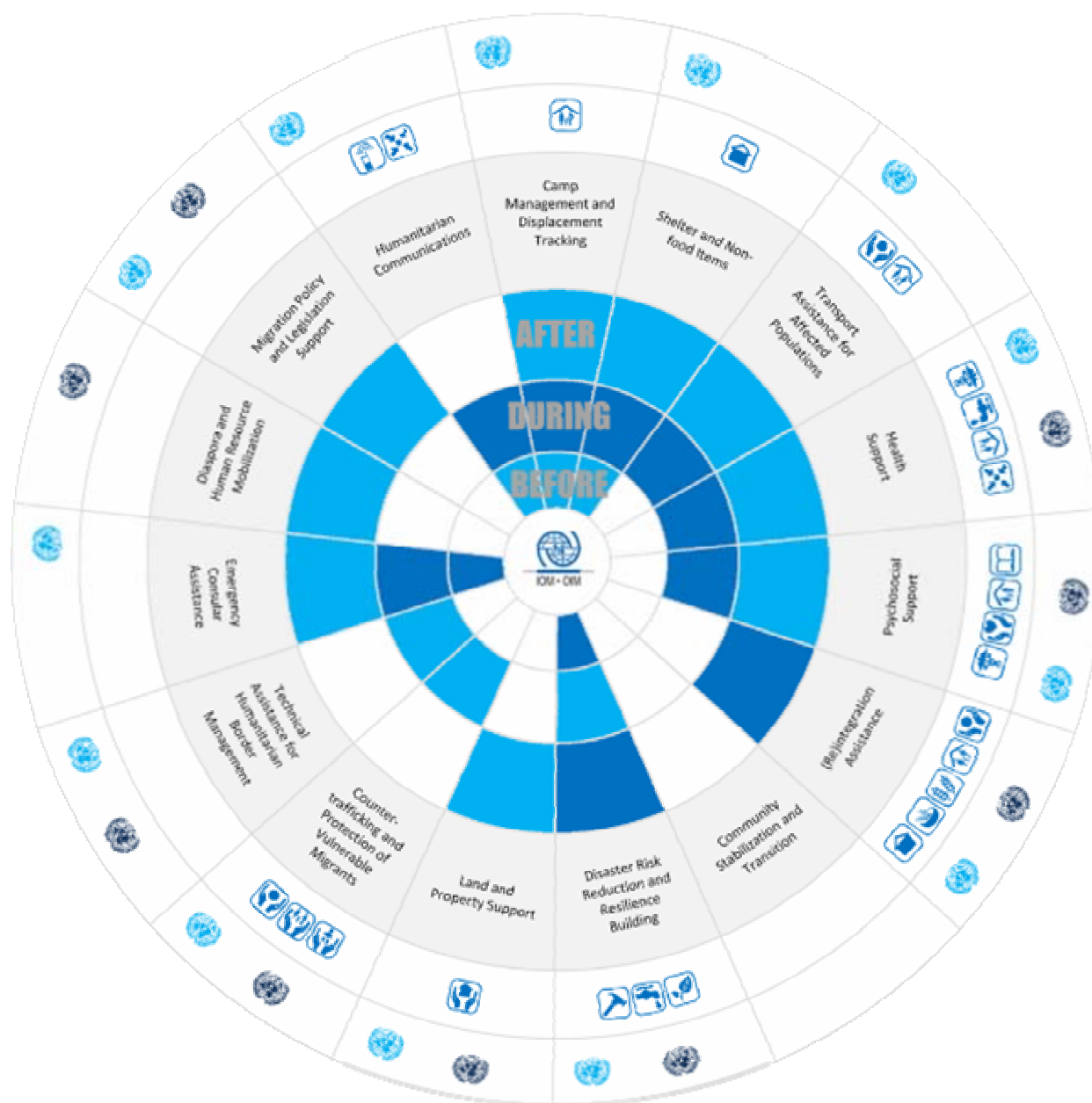
