

### **TERMS OF REFERENCE**

1. Duty Station of the Consultancy: Ulan Bator

2. **Duration of Consultancy:** 1 month

- 3. **Nature of the consultancy:** Category B Revision and adaptation of the training curriculum and guidelines for shelter personnel on the identification and assistance to victims of trafficking, based on the Mongolian legislation; compilation of findings and recommendations emerged from the most recent countertrafficking research.
- 4. **Project Context and Scope:** Strengthening Mongolia's Efforts to Prevent and Respond to Human Trafficking (PX.0134).

Mongolia is a source and destination country for men, women and children subjected to trafficking in persons for the purpose of forced labour and sexual exploitation. Human trafficking within Mongolian borders is also a problem with thousands of women and children estimated to be trafficked every year from rural communities into cities and/or abroad. In Mongolia, IOM is implementing the project 'Strengthening Mongolia's Efforts to Prevent and Respond to Human Trafficking' to help the Government of Mongolia (GoM) consistently identify and protect victims through a set of mutually reinforcing activities centred on communication and outreach, migrant empowerment, data collection and information sharing, capacity building trainings for government officials and stakeholders, and victim direct and reintegration assistance. In support of Output 3.2 (Protection service providers are better equipped to identify and protect VoTs in line with international standards and best practices), IOM is cooperating with the Mongolian Crime Prevention Unit (CCCP) under the Ministry of Justice and Home Affairs, to reinforce state-run systems for the provision of assistance to trafficked persons, based on three main actions:

- 1. Build the capacity of selected OSSCs and other state service providers staff to deal with the specific vulnerabilities of victims of trafficking and;
- 2. Complement the offer of services for victims of trafficking which cannot be delivered in-house by state service providers with complementary assistance provided by IOM (vocational trainings, life-skill trainings and legal assistance).

Within the framework of this project, IOM has worked to reactivate the Counter trafficking NGO network, an informal mechanism aimed at enhancing participating members' coordination on the counter-trafficking response under four objectives: information sharing among participating organizations; information sharing with the government; dissemination of policy information to organizations who are not members of the Sub-Council on Countering Human Trafficking; joint collection of inputs and development of action points to be shared with the government for policy support purposes. Since the entry into force of the Amended to the Criminal Code and the National Program against Trafficking in Persons in 2017, 10 pieces of research¹ focusing on different countertrafficking aspects were produced by the government, international organizations and NGOS, including members of the NGO Network. The government is currently working on a new draft National Program Against Trafficking in Persons and approached IOM to seek assistance in compiling the main findings and recommendations from the abovementioned research studies into a single document to better inform the upcoming plan through

evidence-based and rationalized information.

# 6. Category B Consultants: Tangible and measurable outputs of the work assignment

As per direct request of the Head of the CCCP, under Output 3.2, IOM developed a *Training Curriculum on the Identification, Referral and Assistance of Victims of Trafficking* for State Service Providers and the *Informal Guidelines on the Identification, Referral and Assistance of Victims of Trafficking for State Service Providers in cooperation with the International Organization for Migration in Mongolia* in order to support shelter personnel in identification work and build their capacity to cater VOTs short-term and medium-term needs based on international standards of care. The Head of CCCP thoroughly reviewed the materials prepared and suggested additionally reinforcing the sections related to the national legislation, to further complement and standardise a common understanding based on the Mongolian legislative framework.

Under the overall supervision of the Chief of Mission of IOM China and Mongolia, the direct supervision of the IOM Counter-Trafficking Project Manager and in coordination with the IOM Senior Project Assistant, the incumbent will be responsible to review and complement information on two documents, the developed *Training Curriculum on the Identification, Referral and Assistance of Victims of Trafficking* for State Service Providers and the *Informal Guidelines on the Identification, Referral and Assistance of Victims of Trafficking for State Service Providers in cooperation with the International Organization for Migration in Mongolia,* to ensure their full adherence with Mongolian legislation related to counter-trafficking, assistance and privacy protection (including, but not limiting to the Criminal Code, the Anti-Human Trafficking Law, the Violation Law, Witness Protection Law, Gender-based Violence Law, etc.) as well as with the SOPs used by OSCCs state service providers in their daily operations.

In addition, the incumbent will review the 10 abovementioned research studies and produce a report summarizing the main findings and recommendations to be put forward for government consideration in order to prioritize actions in combating trafficking. The methodology for producing the report is expected to be mixed, including desk review, consultation(s) with the government and additional collection of inputs by relying on the NGO Network meetings facilitated by IOM.

- First deliverable reviewed developed training curriculum on the Protection and Assistance of Victims of Human Trafficking PPTs 1, 2 and 3, and reviewed training curriculum facilitators handbook (with changes highlighted in a nominated color and track changes)- First instalment payment - Deliverable by email by 16 May 2022
- Second deliverable Reviewed Pilot Guidelines on the Identification, Referral and Assistance of Victims of Trafficking in cooperation with the International Organization for Migration for Service Providers in Mongolia - Deliverable by email by 25 May 2022
- 3. **Final deliverable** a Report summarizing the main finding and recommendations of counter-trafficking research conducted in 2017-2022 to be shared for government consideration ahead of the Sub-Council Meeting. *Deliverable by email by 25 May 2022*

- Experience in working with relevant governmental and non-governmental institutions and senior representatives in charge of counter trafficking in person policy and implementation would be a distinct advantage, as well as previous experience working in an international organization.
