SITUATION REPORT #7 **20 October 2016**

Highlights

■ IOM launched USD 20 Million appeal for Hurricane Matthew response

21,179 households in the South, Grande Anse, Nippes and Ouest departments have received NFIs from the IOM-managed pipeline Another 7,244 households are currently receiving NFIs in ongoing distributions that have been allocated to partners and to the Government

Situation Overview

On the morning of Tuesday 4 October, Hurricane Matthew, the first Category 4 to hit the country in the past 52 years with winds up to 150 mph (240 km/h) barreled into southern coastal towns including Jeremie, Les Cayes, Port Salut, Dame Marie and Jacmel, causing major damage to homes, schools and other public buildings.

- 1.4 million people in need of humanitarian assistance; 2.1 million individuals have been affected (UN-OCHA)
- Estimated casualties range from **546 deaths** according to the Directorate of Civil Protection (DPC) up to over **900 deaths** according to international media (The Telegraph)
- 80% of electricity network destroyed in the Southern peninsula and 90% of homes in the South and Grande Anse department have been damaged or destroyed by the Hurricane
- Land access to the most affected areas remains difficult and remote rural areas are slowly being assessed
- 175,000 displaced people are living in 307 temporary shelters (UN-OCHA)
- 34 Cholera Treatment Center have been entirely destroyed
- Important damages were reported to makeshifts tents housing returnees/deportees from the Dominican Republic in Anse-a-Pitres (Belle Anse)

IOM RESPONSE

Assessments

- IOM teams assessed 29 evacuation shelters in the South (Les Cayes, Port a Piment, Coteaux) where 937 households (4,647 individuals) are temporarily residing
- IOM teams assessed 56 evacuation sites in Grande Anse where 2,766 Households (11,055 individuals) are temporarily residing



- In Port-au-Prince, IOM carried out a technical training for OFDA-DART surge staff and NGO partners on proper techniques for the durable installation of plastic tarps on shelters following an emergency.
- IOM Shelter Working Group coordination shared a draft Shelter and NFI strategy with partners for feedback.
- IOM NFI teams coordinated the preparation of a 13 truck convoy scheduled to leave on 21 October for Jeremie and les Cayes (weather permitting).
- IOM Head of Sub-Office will be deployed to Les Cayes on 21 October 2015.

Grande Anse:

- IOM led an NFI distribution targeting 650 households in Jeremie on 16 October. In the neighborhood of Carolie in Jeremie, 1,000 households received NFIs on 20 October 2015. These households received plastic tarpaulins and hygiene kits provided by USAID as well as food items from the World Food Programme. The distribution was carried out in partnership with international NGO Acted.
- IOM air-dropped 700 kilos of basic humanitarian goods, in the remote town of Lory.

Nippes:

• IOM allocated 1,200 buckets to *Solidarites International,* a NGO focusing on WASH activities.

North West:

 Through its partner, IOM distributed NFI's to 1,500 households in Bombardopolis, Mole St. Nicolas and Jean Rabel.
