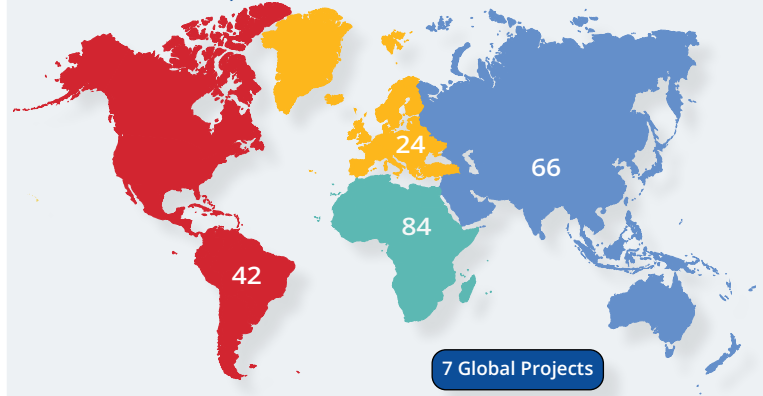


The IOM Development Fund provides seed funding for innovative capacity development initiatives in a range of migration-related areas.

- In 2023, the Fund awarded more than \$16,500,000 in funding to 63 new projects, benefitting 90 IOM Member States.
- The Fund expanded its 'Do The Right Thing' campaign into the IOM Global 'Think about Tomorrow, Act Today' climate mobility campaign, added features from new countries, and hosted exhibitions at COP28 and other events.
- Reviews were conducted on the [Added Value of the Fund, Innovative Initiatives Supported by the Fund](#), and on Fund projects related to [Migration and Security](#).
- The pilot of IOM's Strategic Results Framework (SRF) Outcomes and Indicators was continued through the Fund's 2023 projects. 100% of new projects integrated the SRF, providing findings, best practices, and lessons learned for the 2024 global rollout.
- The Fund supported 15 new [Environment and Climate Change](#) projects as an IOM priority.

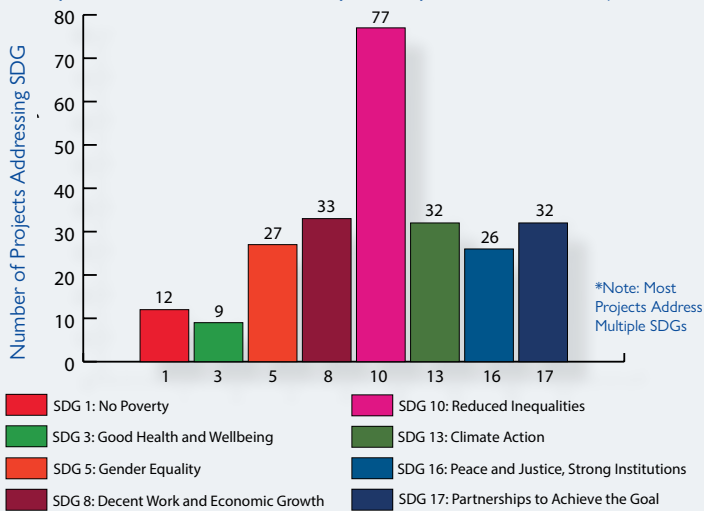

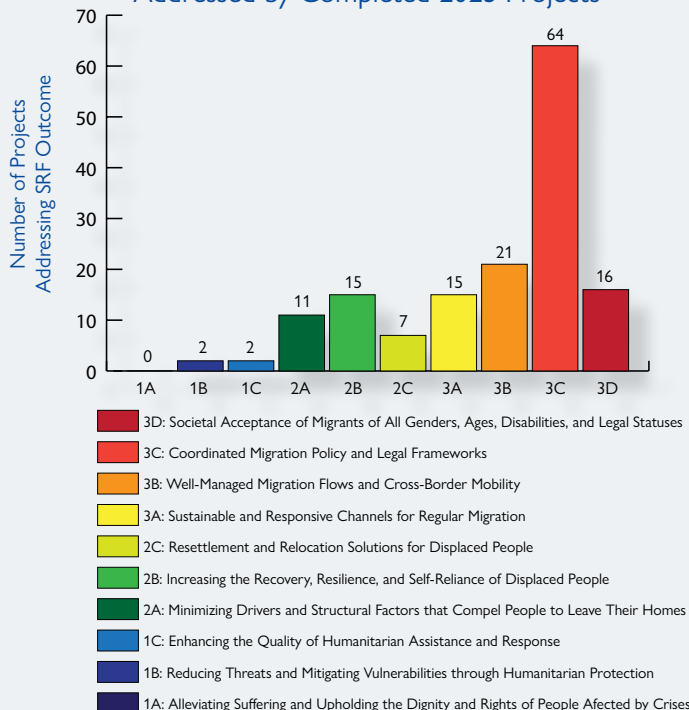

40% of projects completed in 2023 contributed to policy development, demonstrating the Fund's continued role in supporting Member States' needs on policy development.

The work included mainstreaming migration into sectoral policies, supporting policy coherence between national and local levels, conducting capacity-development training for policymakers, and facilitating evidence to support policymaking.



20% of all projects completed in 2023 fell into the Migration and Climate Change portfolio, the most of any thematic area.

Several themes emerge, including many projects aimed at resilience and planning for relocation, others focused on seeking to better understand the impacts of climate change on internal migration, and lastly, an increase in projects aimed at enhancing the engagement of diaspora communities on climate action initiatives.



12% of projects completed in 2023 had highly innovative elements, demonstrating the Fund's increased attention towards innovative project ideas.

These included the creation of a digital fabrications laboratory to bring together Syrian and Turkish students, using satellite projections of sea level rise in Timor-Leste to identify communities at greatest risk, and a 'Sister Cities' project in Mexico that drove increased collaboration on migration at the local level.



20% of the projects completed in 2023 have already received follow-up funding for further interventions, demonstrating the effectiveness and impact of the seed funding.

Follow-up funding has come from donors including the Migration Multi-Partner Trust Fund, the European Union, the African Development Bank, and the Governments of Japan and Denmark, among others. The number of projects receiving follow-up interventions is expected to continue to rise through 2024.
