## Capacity Building on Ethical Recruitment and Employment of Migrant Workers for SMEs in Malaysia

In 2023, IOM started a collaboration with the Malaysia Employer Federation (MEF) to engage SMEs on fair and ethical recruitment and employment of migrant workers. Two trainings were recently concluded in Kuala Lumpur and Penang, with more planned in Johor, Pahang, Sarawak and Sabah for the rest of the year. SMEs are the backbone of the economy, accounting for well over 90 per cent of total businesses in Malaysia and are essential actors to engage to strengthen the protection of workers and ensure safe and dignified migration.



## Improving Domestic Workers' Effective Access to Protection

In June, IOM and ILO Malaysia engaged key national stakeholders to discuss how to increase domestic workers' effective access to the national social security protection scheme (SOCSO), and challenges and opportunities of extending domestic workers' eligibility to more social security benefits. The event was attended by over 70 representatives from the government, private recruitment agency associations, international organisations, civil society organisations and domestic worker groups.




## Shifting Narratives on Migrants and Refugees Through Media Engagement

IOM Malaysia collaborated with Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) in organising a workshop on "Story-Telling for Inclusion and Human Rights in Malaysia: Strengthening the Role of the Media", aimed at promoting inclusive and empathetic reporting in the Malaysian media. The workshop builds on the Dari Dapur campaign which promotes human rights-based narratives and a culture of welcoming migrants in Malaysia by using food and recipes from the migrant and refugees communities in the country. ## Launch of the IOM's Labour Migration Process Mapping Guide

IOM launched the Labour Migration Process Mapping Guide in May 2023. This practical tool for businesses is designed to identify, mitigate, and address the human and labour rights risks to migrant workers within international supply chains. During the event, speakers discussed trends, progresses and good practices on fair and ethical recruitment and how businesses can use the Guide to enhance supply chain transparency and address the specific vulnerabilities of migrant workers. IOM looks forward to continue to work with private sector partners in Malaysia to rollout the Guide.






#### **Refugee and Migration Movement Management**

IOM continues to facilitate voluntary, safe and orderly migration with health assessments, and the movement of refugees resettling to 7 countries (with a larger percentage being resettled to USA, Australia, and Canada), as well as voluntary movement support to stranded migrants wanting to return home.




