


YEMEN CRISIS IOM REGIONAL RESPONSE



- On 31 May, the Yemen Task Force on Population Movement, co-chaired by IOM, reported 1,019,762 people displaced inside Yemen.
- Due to continuous shelling in the Northern city of Haradh, IOM has started to relocate migrants hosted in its Migrant Response Center, and transported so far 474 Ethiopians to a new facility in Hudaydah.
- Between 26 March and 3 June, 16,801 people have arrived in Djibouti by air and sea. On average, 1,680 individuals have arrived each week in Djibouti from Yemen since 26 March.
- Discussions are underway to resume IOM evacuation flights next week.

Situation Overview

The conflict in Yemen has now entered its third month. The death toll continues to rise, with nearly 2,000 deaths reported since the beginning of the conflict.

Due to increased violence and continuous restrictions imposed on commercial imports, it is estimated that 78% of the population is now in need of humanitarian assistance, representing almost a 30% increase compared to precrisis estimates (OCHA).

The latest report on internal displacement in Yemen indicates 158,887 households have been displaced representing 1,019,762 individuals. Hajjah and Al Dhale'e are the governorates hosting the highest number of IDPs, with more than 200,000 displaced persons each. IDPs mainly originate from Sanaa, Al Dhale'e and Aden.

On 3 June, the Security Council endorsed the UN Secretary General's call for a second humanitarian pause in order to allow assistance to reach the Yemeni people urgently. The Security Council also urged all parties to facilitate the urgent delivery of humanitarian assistance, as well as rapid, safe, and unhindered access for humanitarian actors to reach people in need of humanitarian assistance, including medical assistance.

As of 4 June, nearly 30,000 people have arrived in Djibouti and Somalia from Yemen.

HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES IN YEMEN

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)



During this week, IOM started water trucking to Al-Gamhoria Hospital in Aden, which is the second largest government hospital in Aden. In Abyan, water trucking services expanded to 30 schools in Khanfar (15), Zinjubar (2), and Lawder (13) reaching out 5,424 individuals. Water trucking is ongoing in Dhalea providing 30,000 liters per day to Al-Nasr Hospital, and 12,000 liters per day in Dhubaiyat area, reaching around 4.583 individuals.

Furthermore, IOM completed the five-day rehabilitation of water and sewage networks in Malla, Crater, Khormaksar and Altawahi districts.

In Malla, the technical teams maintained the main pumping station, which provides water to Alkaloua'a area, and rehabilitated the main pipeline near the market in Altawahi. In Khormaksar, most of the pipe networks in Al-Sa'ada, Al-Salam and near Sahat Al-Urodh were rehabilitated, as well as the pipe networks in Al-Khusaf near the football playground area, and Al-Qate'e area in Crater district.

Health

During the past week, three IOM mobile health clinics continued to operate in Aden in Al Mansoorah, Sheikh Othman and Inma city where most of the IDP families are located. The total number of people served through these clinics is 2,236 including 704 women, 499 men, 575 girls and 458 boys. Similarly, IOM's health staff support for the '22 May' Hospital in Aden continued this week, treating a total of 2,641 cases including 744 injured people and 1,897 other medical cases. In addition, IOM's medical shipment from Djibouti arrived in Aden on 29 May, enabling IOM to deliver some medicines and medical supplies to Al Medan and Khaled, both public health facilities in Aden.

The IOM mobile clinic in Khanfer district of Abyan governorate, which serves IDPs and their host community, provided services to 702 people including 411 females and 291 males. Moreover, IOM's medical staff support for the Al Razie Hospital and Al Khaber health facility, which continued during the week, assisted 522 patients including 183 injured cases, 260 other medical cases and 79 deliveries of pregnant women. Also in Abyan, the Lawder referral-level hospital was supported with medicines and medical supplies. IOM's medical team placed in Azan Hospital in Shabwah governorate treated 454 patients of which 43 were injury cases.

This week, the two IOM mobile health clinics continued serving the IDPs located in six schools in Amanat Al-Asima and Bani Alhareth of Sana'a governorate. A total of 446 people benefitted from health services, including 127 women, 69 men, 130 girls and 120 boys. Additionally, two mobile health teams worked in different districts of Hajja governorate, serving a total number of 363 persons.

Assistance to Migrants in Yemen



For the last two months, IOM protection staff in Aden have been screening and assisting vulnerable migrants who come to the Migrant Response Point (MRP) in Basateen, and to the local mosque for one meal a day. This last week has been particularly difficult in Basateen as the armed conflict and street fighting spilled over into the neighborhood.

IOM also continues to provide life-saving humanitarian support to Third Country Nationals (TCNs) mainly concentrated in Haradh. Around 650 migrants have been stranded and seek assistance in IOM's Migrant Response Center (MRC) in Haradh. Although much of the Yemeni population in Haradh



has fled because of the daily airstrikes, the migrants are left with no choice but to seek refuge in and around the MRC. IOM does its best to provide for their basic need of water, food, medical care and temporary shelter.

During the reporting period, 474 migrants were transported to Hudaydah in four buses arranged by IOM. These hundreds of destitute migrants are temporarily accommodated in a school in Hudaydah where they receive food, water and NFI kits until their return home. Around 200 stranded migrants remain at the MRC in Haradh and will join the others in Hudaydah in the coming days. With the ongoing relocations, the number of migrants approaching IOM to request evacuation assistance is likely to increase.

DISPLACEMENT FROM YEMEN TO THE HORN OF AFRICA

As of 4 June, 29,245 people have arrived in Djibouti and Somalia from Yemen.

Arrivals in Djibouti

Between 26 March and 3 June, 16,801 people have arrived in Djibouti by air and sea, of which 40% of the total arrivals are transiting TCNs, 50% are Yemenis and 10% Djiboutians. An average of 1,680 individuals have arrived each week in Djibouti fleeing Yemen since 26 March.

This week, IOM assisted 14 TCNs (12 Ethiopians, 2 Bangladeshis) who arrived in Djibouti without the resources or documentation to leave the port area. These individuals were allowed on Djiboutian territory under IOM's care and were provided with food and accommodation while onward transportation is being organized.

In the last two months, IOM has assisted 447 TCNs to return to their countries of origin, upon their arrival in Djibouti Ville (at port and airport level).



On 1 June, 103 Yemeni refugees were received in IOM's MRC in Obock. During their stay, they benefitted from shelter, food, emergency health and WASH services. Since the beginning of the crisis, more than 500 Yemenis have been hosted in IOM's

MRC (approx. 30% of the overall caseload registered so far) before being relocated to UNHCR's refugee camp.

IOM is providing 1,500 liters of drinking water at the port's reception center daily. Moreover, during the reporting period, IOM's medical team conducted a rapid assessment of the reception center at the port. This assessment identified several gaps in regards to hygiene conditions and access to health services for refugees and TCNs. Several potential locations were also assessed to potentially open an additional transit center in Djibouti Ville, aiming at decongesting the port's reception area, improving TCNs' and refugees' access to services and information, as well as increasing national authorities' capacity to cope with the population influx from Yemen.

Additionally, 70 metric tons of Non-Food Items were shipped from Djibouti to Yemen, including kitchen sets, mats, tarpaulins, blankets and mosquito nets. The items are expected to arrive in Aden on 5 June.

Arrivals in Somalia


Four boats arrived between 28 May and 3 June in Somalia, carrying a total of 565 individuals, bringing the total number of arrivals to 12,444.

Puntland: On 1 June, one boat carrying 183 individuals docked in Bosaso port. The total number of arrivals in Puntland now stands at 8,635. IOM assisted the new arrivals with snacks and water, as well as transportation to the reception center, where IOM provides health and WASH assistance. IOM also supported 366 individuals of an earlier arrival on 27 May with onward transportation assistance to Mogadishu, Baidoa, Kismayo and other locations in South Central Somalia, bringing the total number of people assisted with onward transportation to 773, including 32 TCNs. Partners on the ground continue to look into increasing the reception capacity in Bosaso, as more large boats are expected to dock in the coming days and weeks.

Somaliland: Three boats arrived on 28 May, 29 May and 2 June, carrying a total of 382 persons, increasing the total number of arrivals in Somaliland to 3,714. Two of these boats arrived during the period when Berbera port was officially closed, and although there were delays in disembarkation for Somali nationals from South Central Somalia on one occasion, all arrivals were allowed to disembark and to receive assistance in Somaliland. The Somaliland authorities have now officially rescinded their earlier statement and have reopened the port and welcoming everyone who is fleeing the conflict in Yemen.

IOM and UNHCR have committed to support the Somaliland authorities in assisting those who arrive in Somaliland and to provide onward transportation assistance to those who require it to South Central Somalia. To date, IOM has provided onward transportation assistance to 768 individuals from Somaliland, mainly to Mogadishu, but also to other areas in Somaliland and Ethiopia. Furthermore, 753 individuals were provided with medical assistance, including 15 referrals to hospitals in Berbera and Hargeisa. Partners continue to look into increasing the reception capacity by locating a third reception center and discussions with the local and regional authorities are ongoing.


