



IOM Iraq: Mosul Response Update #7

4 - 10 November 2016

IOM's Response

+600 tents (1,200 total to date) delivered to Al-Qayara Airstrip.

In response to the arrival of 400 new IDPs to the already full Jada'h camp, IOM responded with the provision of 200 Emergency Sealing-off Kits, in addition to supporting technical staff in setting up new tents in the camp on 10 November.

Nov. 9: IOM teams conducted "Basic Camp Management and Protection" training to local NGOs who will be running the Haj Ali Emergency Site.

Nov. 8: The director of operations of the European Commission Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection Department (ECHO) visited the Al-Qayara Airstrip Emergency Site.

Nov 5: The Director General of IOM visited the Al-Qayara and Haj Ali Emergency Sites to assess their readiness to begin receiving IDPs.

Nov 7: IOM Mobile Medical Teams conducted afternoon consultations at Hasan Sham camp to address a service gap that occurs when other health partners close their primary health care facilities.



*These numbers are taken from the IOM Iraq Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) Emergency Tracking, covering displacement from Salah al-Din, Ninewa, Erbil and Kirkuk governorates.

IOM is responding to displacements caused by military operations to retake areas in the Mosul corridor that started on 16 June 2016.

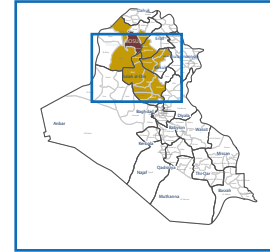
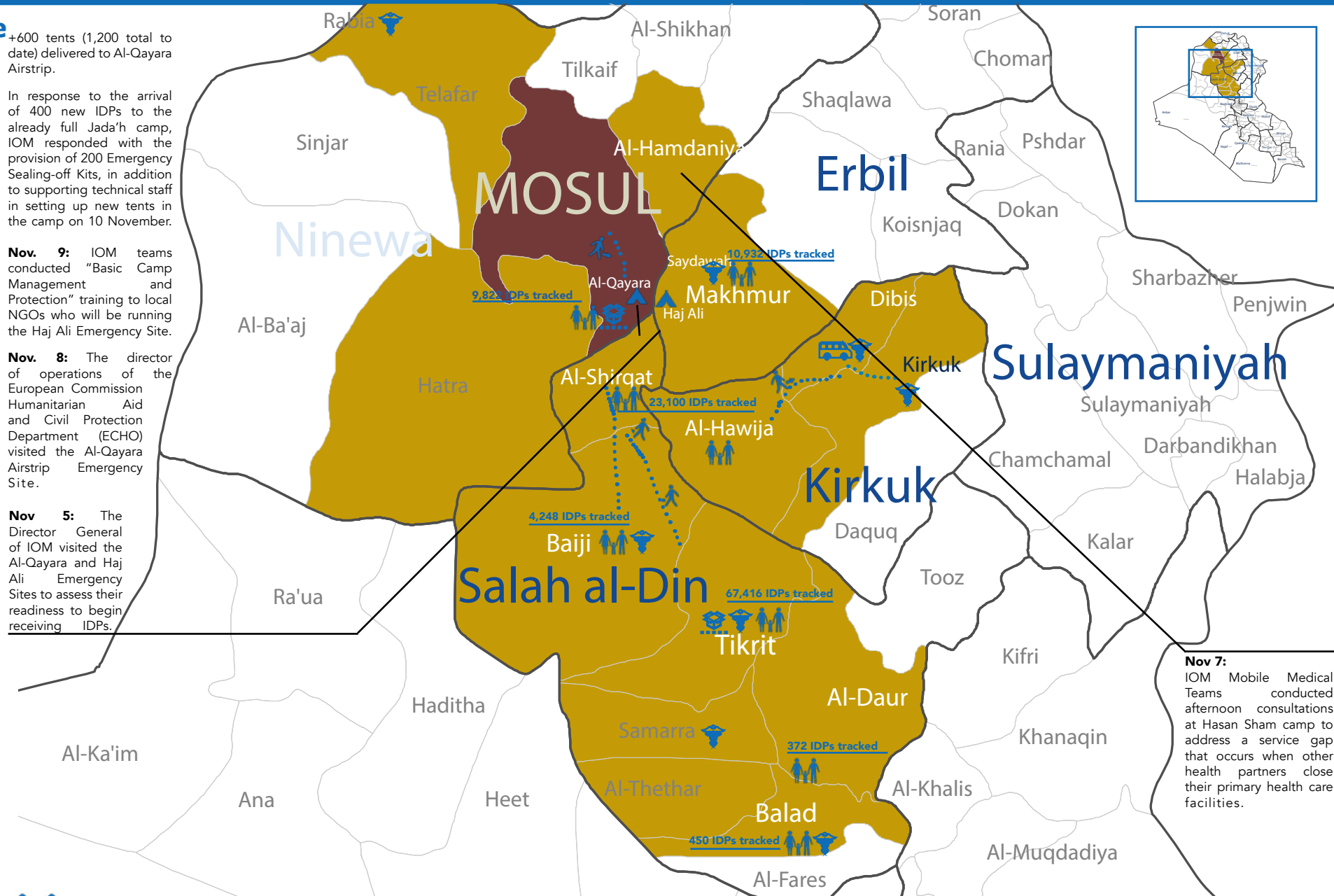

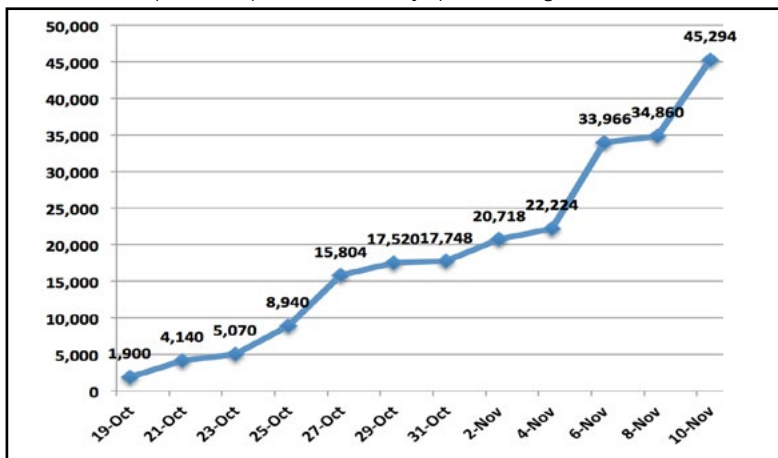
Migration Context: Mosul



- Over the reporting period, over 23,000 people were identified as displaced, more than doubling the identified displaced population since the last observation period.

- The proportion of people displaced from the district of Mosul increased from 70% to over 83%, and IOM Iraq's Emergency Tracking identified the first IDPs from the center of Mosul late in the reporting period.

Number of persons displaced since military operations began on 17 October



- The proportion of IDPs currently residing in Al-Hamdaniya increased from around 30% of the displaced (6,678 individuals out of the 22,224 identified on 4 November) to over 60% (27,348 individuals out of the 45,294 identified on 10 November).

IOM Response



Non-Food Items:

- 200 NFI kits were distributed to displaced families in Anbar.



Health:

- 4,587 health consultations were carried out in Salah al-Din, Yahyawa Camp, Kirkuk Governorate; and Rabi'a, Hasan Sham and Qayara, Ninewa.
- 311 health screenings were carried out at Dibis check point.



CCCM:

- IOM staff has been hired to support camp management at the Iraq government built camp at Jada'h, Ninewa Governorate.
- The first of two stages of training was carried out on 9 November for camp management/camp coordination staff who will be running the IOM emergency sites. Topics covered included definition and core activities of camp management; IDP arrival, reception and registration; NFI distribution; coordination of partners, needs and gaps. The second phase of the training will be carried out next week.



Shelter:

- 1,050 Sealing-off Kits and Emergency Shelter Kits were distributed in Khazar Camp, Erbil; Kirkuk; and Tikrit, Salah Al-Din.



Emergency Sites:

- Haj Ali: Demining, earthworks and tent demarcation in the site are completed, tent installation is 60% complete, and 1 IOM Rub Hall has been installed.
- Al-Qayara Airstrip: Earthworks, tent installation, fencing, road installation, and WASH facilities are all around 60% complete, and 4 IOM Rub Halls have been installed.

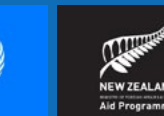
Voices of Displacement

Abdullah

"A group of us, all displaced, wanted to keep playing soccer, so we got together once a week and played in a six-player soccer field. But we soon did not have enough money for transportation or field fees. So instead we continued playing soccer in our neighborhood's streets. We used to go to the local vegetable market at seven in the morning to collect plastic boxes, which we used as barricades for jumping exercises.

People laughed at us when they saw us practicing in the street. Now I am participating in professional soccer training, in a proper field, for free. This training is taking my skills to the next level. I learn much more than just soccer skills here. I learn discipline, self-respect, respect for time, respect for my team members, and sportsmanship. I hope that one day I can play for Manchester United. The English Premier League is my favorite, it is fast-paced, and there is a lot of skillful moves" said Abdullah, 15, who displaced from Qaraqosh, Ninewa.

Abdullah and 49 others between the ages 9 and 20 are taking part in an IOM soccer school training for displaced Iraqi children and young men in Ainkawa, Erbil. The activity is supported by the Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA).
