

## IOM Iraq: Mosul Response Update #29

27 July - 9 August 2017

On 2 August 2017, IOM distributed business support packages (BSP) to 25 beneficiaries in Qayara town, south of Mosul, to support the local population with livelihoods opportunities. Packages include essential tools that help the beneficiaries to re-start their micro/small businesses that they owned before ISIL took over Qayara in 2014. Business types include smithery/welding, motorbike trucks for transportation, construction equipment for rent, barbershops, restaurants, grocery stores, and other businesses. IOM is finalizing connecting each and every tent at Qayara and Haj Ali emergency sites to the electricity grid. Each tent is equipped with a florescent light and a power socket. Distribution boxes and 400 KVA and 250 KVA transformers have been installed in each sector. Test powering has already been done at Qayara emergency site. The tent lights will provide a safer environment for the camp residents at night, while the power socket will allow IDPs to use their fans and air coolers more often to cope with the summer temperatures, as well as recharging their electronic devices such as phones, power banks, and rechargeable fans. ## Stories of Displacement: Abu Ahmed's Story

"I have seven children, between 7 and 15 years old. Before ISIL took control of Mosul, we had a normal, simple life. I worked as a daily paid worker to support my family. But when ISIL took over, our situation became very difficult.

There weren't many job opportunities. My eldest son, Ahmed, dropped out of school and started looking for a job. He looked for months until he finally found one in January 2017, in a private flourmill. We thought that we would have a better life with this additional source of income, but the mill was bombed shortly after, because most mills in the city were run by ISIL.

Ahmed stayed under the rubble for three hours before he could be extracted and taken to hospital, where he stayed in a coma for about a month. Because he did not belong to ISII, he did not receive proper treatment. I had to sell everything I had. I had to ask for help, and borrow from friends and relatives to buy medication.

Things got even worse when the hospital was bombed; I took my son out of there, but he was in a critical condition. He was severely injured in the back of his head," said Ahmed's father.

Ahmed received health care support and a wheelchair at IOM's health clinic at Qayara emergency site, but he still needs more specialized support.

"Ahmed is alive, but because of his head injury, he cannot open his right eye, he has lost control of his left hand, is paralyzed and needs a surgery to go back to normal life." Abu Ahmed said.
